Whether Democrat or Republican, we must stay diligent, strong and focused in defense of our union and the labor movement while we appreciate our current successes. 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



WAR ON WORKERS: Good news for unions

There is plenty happening that Americans can feel not too great about currently – except for organized labor.

A recent Gallup survey asked Americans about lost confidence in 16 "major institutions" - ranging from the Supreme Court to religion to organized labor. Only one didn't see confidence drop: Organized labor.

In 2021, 28% of respondents said they had a great deal or quite a lot of confidence in organized labor. That was true in 2022 as well.

Democrats still have the most confidence in organized labor, with 41% saying that they have a great deal or a lot of confidence in it. Republicans' confidence in organized labor grew from 13% to 15%, while independents' confidence falling from 28% to 27%.

The stable confidence in organized labor comes after a year

of prominent union efforts from workers at behemoths like Starbucks and Amazon.

In 2021, the study found that the approval of labor unions was at 65% – its highest level since 1965. Approval was particularly high among Democrats, younger workers, and lower-earning workers.

Even with that seemingly good news, union membership remained low and fell yet again in 2021. The union membership rate dipped from 10.8% in 2020 to 10.3% in 2021, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics. In 2020, 14.3 million workers were in a union; in 2021, just 14 million were – far below historic membership highs. Labor advocates attribute that decline to restrictive labor law making it difficult to organize.

JUVENILE COURT:

FIGHTING FOR THE RIGHTS OF ALL

In 2020, the six-judge panel at Cuyahoga County Juvenile Court decided to bust the union by repudiating our contract and denying 135 employees that previously bargained for rights.

As conditions inside the detention center worsened, Local 860 continued to fight for their representation. Without it, workers lost their voice to stand up and demand better treatment for the juveniles and for themselves.


We reached out to stakeholders in the community who were equally appalled to learn of the lack of outdoor activities, daily school, clean environment, access to proper medical/mental care and the limited contact with families.

Together, we built a coalition to get their rights back. Addressing concerns with clergy members, City Council, as well as many other politicians and professionals with a stake or expertise in the juvenile court system and/or the right of workers.

Their struggle for representation grew into an outstanding, united communitywide battle for juvenile justice reform.

Local 860 continues to fulfill labor's legacy as a pillar of strength to the community. Together with our coalition partners, we continue to fight for our right to represent and help usher in positive changes for the juveniles and staff alike

History has shown us that Labor Rights, Civil Rights and Children's Rights are connected. Local 860 will continue to fight to secure the rights of all.



INFRASTRUCTURE Update

NATION

Over the next five years, \$590.7 billion will be spent on U.S. transportation networks through the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act of 2021, the largest investment in infrastructure since construction of the Interstate Highway System.

These funds will be distributed to states, planning organizations, and local jurisdictions through various grants and funding programs. In addition to the \$590.7 billion, \$273.1 billion will be invested in energy, broadband, water, watershed, and coastline infrastructure, as well as other infrastructure programs.

This is all part of the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021. It also includes about \$350 billion in emergency funding for states and local governments and \$30.5 billion for public transportation. Historically, about 70 percent of infrastructure funding is nonfederal, meaning these funds will be further leveraged through investment by states, local jurisdictions, and the private sector.

This Act is a game changer to address the longstanding infrastructure needs including roads, bridges, electrical grid improvements, along with money for newer needs like broadband service and electric vehicle charging stations.

OHIO

According to the White House, much of that money is slated to go directly to the states, with the biggest states - California, Texas, and New York - in line to receive more than \$45 billion in direct aid. However, Ohio is listed in the top 10 states in need of

INFRASTRUCTURE Update









ODOT also launched their Municipal Bridge Program, a \$47.5 million increase in yearly funding allocation for local bridge projects for the next five years. A sorely needed venture that will bring Ohio's investment in county and municipal bridges to \$112.5 million per year.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) announced the 2022 notices of funding availability for the agency's Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act (WIFIA) program and the State Infrastructure Financing Authority WIFIA (SWIFIA) program. This year's funding will provide up to \$6.5 billion in total funding to support \$13 billion in water infrastructure projects while creating more than 40,000 jobs.

Of those numbers, the State of Ohio will receive \$241 million in funding for water projects in 2022 through the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law. This funding will be provided through EPA's State Revolving Fund (SRF) programs.

All of these projects are not only great for the safety and wellness of all Ohioans, but they will create jobs while upgrading Ohio's aging infrastructure. Jobs that will provide work and responsibility to Local 860 and its members for years to come.






























































KEEP YOUR UNION DUES UP TO DATE
